HOW TO INTERPRET YOUR SCORE

Your linear score sheet is colour coded to help you with the interpretation of your score. The aim is to get as many ticks as possible in the dark green areas of the sheet. Red fields indicate areas that will present problems to the long term soundness of your horse or foal.

Your veterinary numerical score will make up 20% of your final Futurity mark. It will consist of two equally weighted elements:

- 1. The way your foal or young horse presents himself or herself now (worth 10% of the final mark)
- 2. The way the vet prognosticates the horse or foal to present himself or herself at the age for optimal performance (also worth 10% of the final mark)

The Grade Boundaries:

0 - not presented; 0.5 - 2.5 serious issues; 2.5 - 5 issues that prevent a successful sporting career; 5 - 7.5 manageable issues; 7.5 - 9 minor manageable issues; 9 - 9.5 very few very minor manageable issues;
